

I am learning to read my ABCs.





Your child is learning to **read the letters of the alphabet**. Use the activities on pages 2–13 to help your child at home. Here are some daily activities for you to try:

- **Print letters on a sheet of paper.** Ask your child to point out letters that you name.
- Ask your child to **find a particular letter in old magazines** or newspapers. Have her cut and paste
 each matching letter onto a sheet of paper.

- As you ride in the car or on a bus, ask your child to name letters in traffic signs. On a long trip, try to find all the letters of the alphabet by looking at signs and license plates.
- Read books with your child about the alphabet. Here are a few books that you might find in your local library:

A Is for Astronaut, by Cathy Beylon and Victoria Fremont. Alpha Bugs, by David Carter.

ABC for You and Me, by Margaret Girnis.

26 Letters and 99 Cents, by Tana Hoban.

1. Show Uppercase Letters First

It is best to show uppercase letters (A, B, C, . . .) first. Once your child can identify the uppercase letters, show the lowercase letters (a, b, c, . . .).

2. Show Just a Few Letters at a Time

Show only one or two letters at a time. Make sure your child can name the letters you have shown before introducing new ones.

3. Letters Can Look Different

Some letters can be written in more than one way. For example, \mathbf{Q} or \mathbf{a} .

4. Notice Letters While Reading

When reading books to your child, have your child name the letters in the story.

5. Give Your Child Name Cards

Make cards with your child's name on them. Use the name cards to label your child's personal items.

6. Create Artistic Letters

Let your child create animals or people using printed letters as part of her picture.

Activities

Activity 1 Read Letters A-I

Step 1: MATCH THE LETTERS

Point to the *A* in large print at the top of page 3.

Say: This is an A. Can you find another A on the page?

Point to another A.

Give help as needed. After your child finds one A,

Say: Good. Now point to another A.

Do this for the other letters on the page.

Step 2: POINT TO THE LETTERS

Once your child can match the letters, ask your child to find a letter when you say its name.

Say: Point to an A on this page.

After your child points to the correct letter,

Say: Good. Now point to another A.

Do this for the other letters on the page.

Step 3: READ THE LETTERS

Once your child can point to the correct letters,

Ask: What letter is this?

Do this for all the letters on the page.

Step 4: FIND TWO MATCHING LETTERS

Have your child find two matching letters. For example, say: **Find the two As.**

Activity 2 Read Letters J-R

Step 1: MATCH THE LETTERS

Point to the *J* in large print at the top of page 5.

Say: This is a *J*. Can you find another *J* on the page? Point to another *J*.

Give help as needed. After your child finds one *J*,

Say: Good. Now point to another J.

Do this for the other letters on the page.

Step 2: POINT TO THE LETTERS

Once your child can match the letters, ask your child to find a letter when you say its name.

Say: Point to a J on this page.

After your child points to the correct letter,

Say: Good. Now point to another J.

Do this for the other letters on the page.

Step 3: READ THE LETTERS

Once your child can point to the correct letters,

Ask: What letter is this?

Do this for all the letters on the page.

Step 4: FIND TWO MATCHING LETTERS

Have your child find two matching letters.

For example, say: Find the two Ms.

Activity 3 Can You Find a Match?

WHAT YOU'LL NEED: Two identical sets of uppercase letter cards

Shuffle the cards, and place them facedown on a table. Have your child select any two cards and say the letter names aloud. If the cards match, your child may keep the cards and take a second turn to draw two cards that match. If the cards do not match, they are put back facedown on the table. The next person then takes a turn. When all the cards have been matched, have everyone count their pairs to see who has the most.

Activity 4 Read Letters S-Z

Step 1: MATCH THE LETTERS

Point to the S in large print at the top of page 7.

Say: This is an S. Can you find another S on the page? Point to another S.

Do this for the other letters on the page.

Step 2: POINT TO THE LETTERS

Once your child can match the letters, ask your child to find a letter when you say its name.

Say: Point to an S on this page.

After your child points to the correct letter,

Say: Good. Now point to another S.

Do this for the other letters on the page.

Step 3: READ THE LETTERS

Once your child can point to the correct letters,

Ask: What letter is this?

Do this for all the letters on the page.

Step 4: FIND TWO MATCHING LETTERS

Have your child find two matching letters.

For example, say: Find the two Ys.

Activity 5 Family Grab Bag

WHAT YOU'LL NEED:

- Letter cards for each of the uppercase letters
- A bag

Place uppercase letter cards into a bag. Have your child reach into the bag without looking, pull out a letter card, and name the letter. If your child correctly names the letter, she keeps the card. Then, give the other people a turn, one at a time.

When all the letter cards have been identified, have everyone count their cards to see who has the most.

Activity 7 Can You Find a Match?

WHAT YOU'LL NEED: Two identical sets of lowercase letter cards

Shuffle the cards, and place them facedown on a table. Have your child select any two cards and say the letter names aloud. If the cards match, your child may keep the cards and take a second turn to draw two cards that match. If the cards do not match, the cards are put back facedown on the table. The next person then takes a turn. When all the cards have been matched, have everyone count their pairs to see who has the most.
